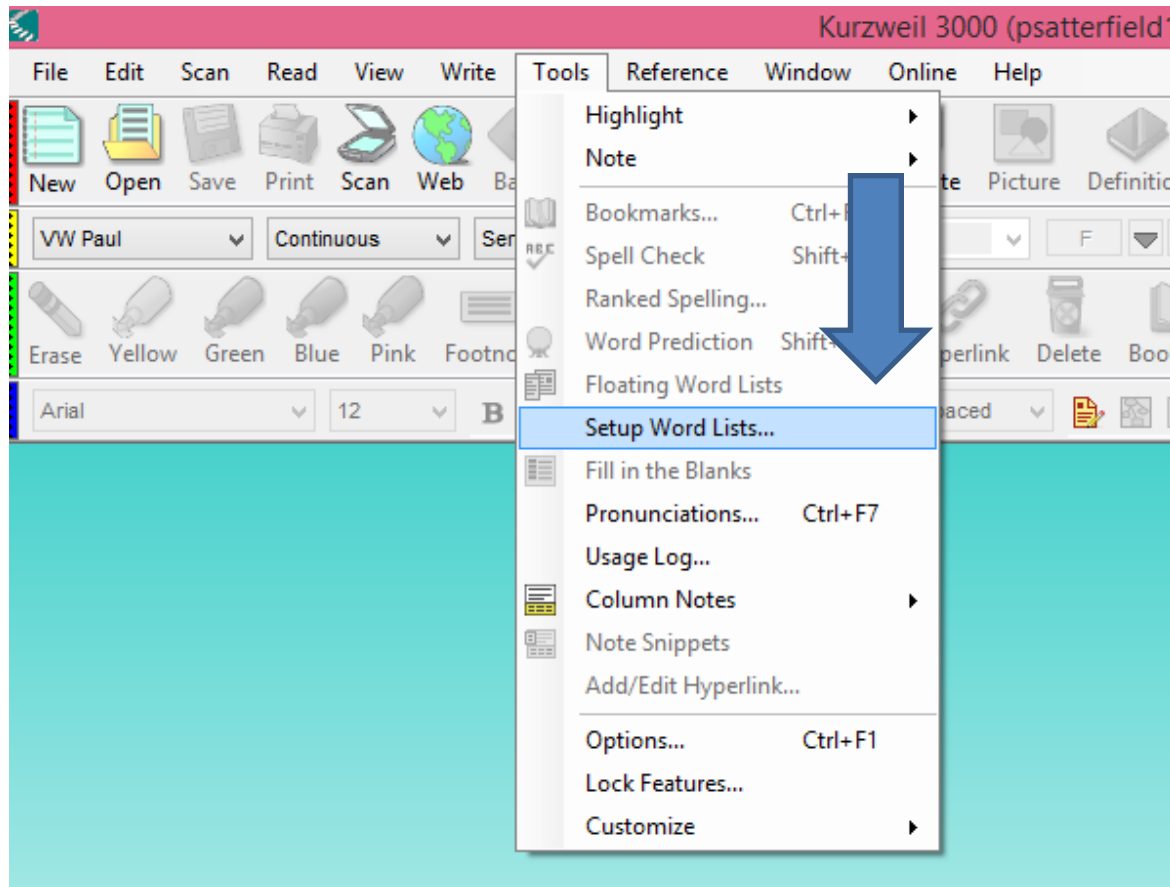

Writing Support through Word Lists

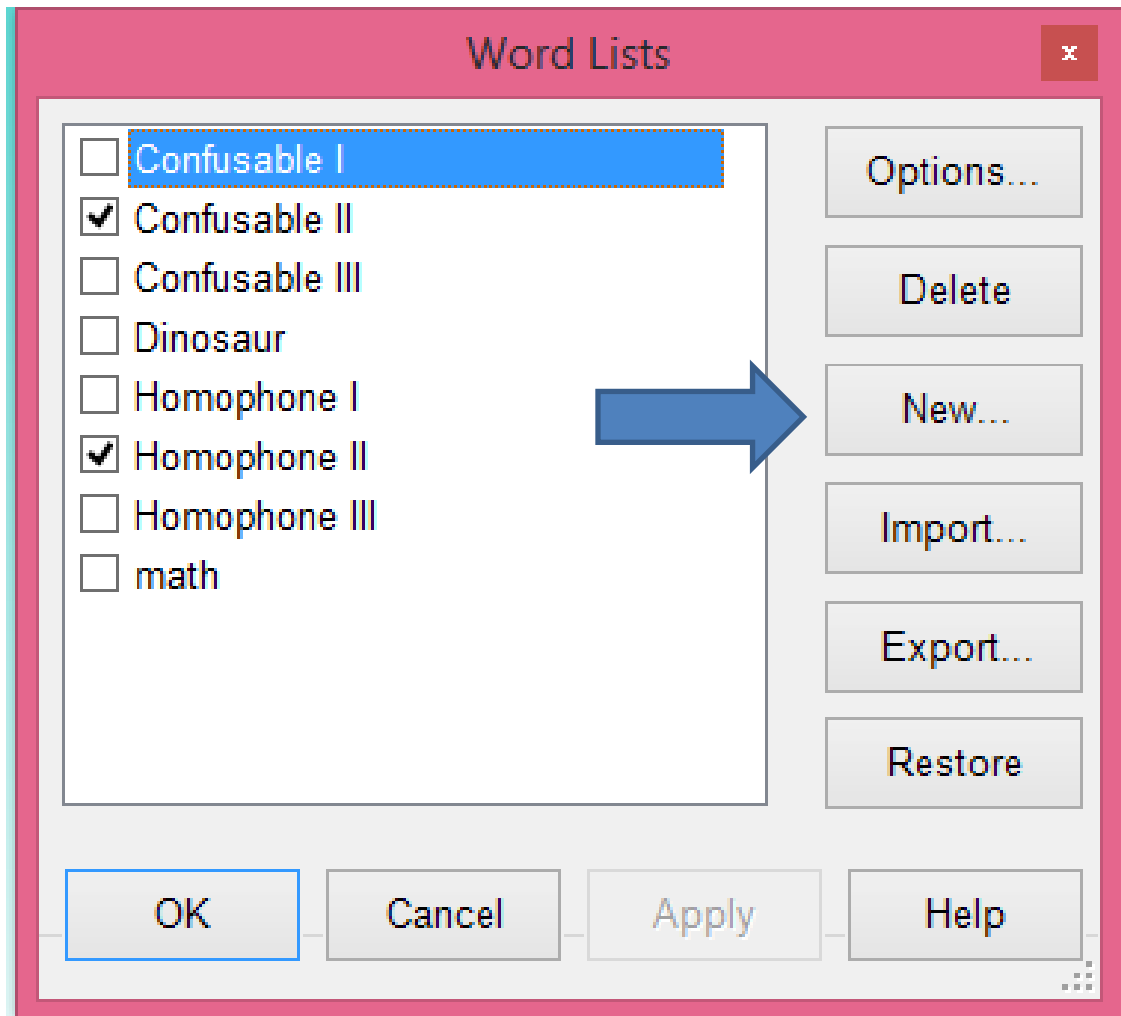
- Use **Floating Word Lists** to show words that students might want to use while writing on a particular topic
- Word Lists can also be selected within **Word Prediction** to give specific vocabulary preference while supporting spelling and grammar with prediction.

Writing Support through Word Lists



- Select Tools, Setup Word Lists

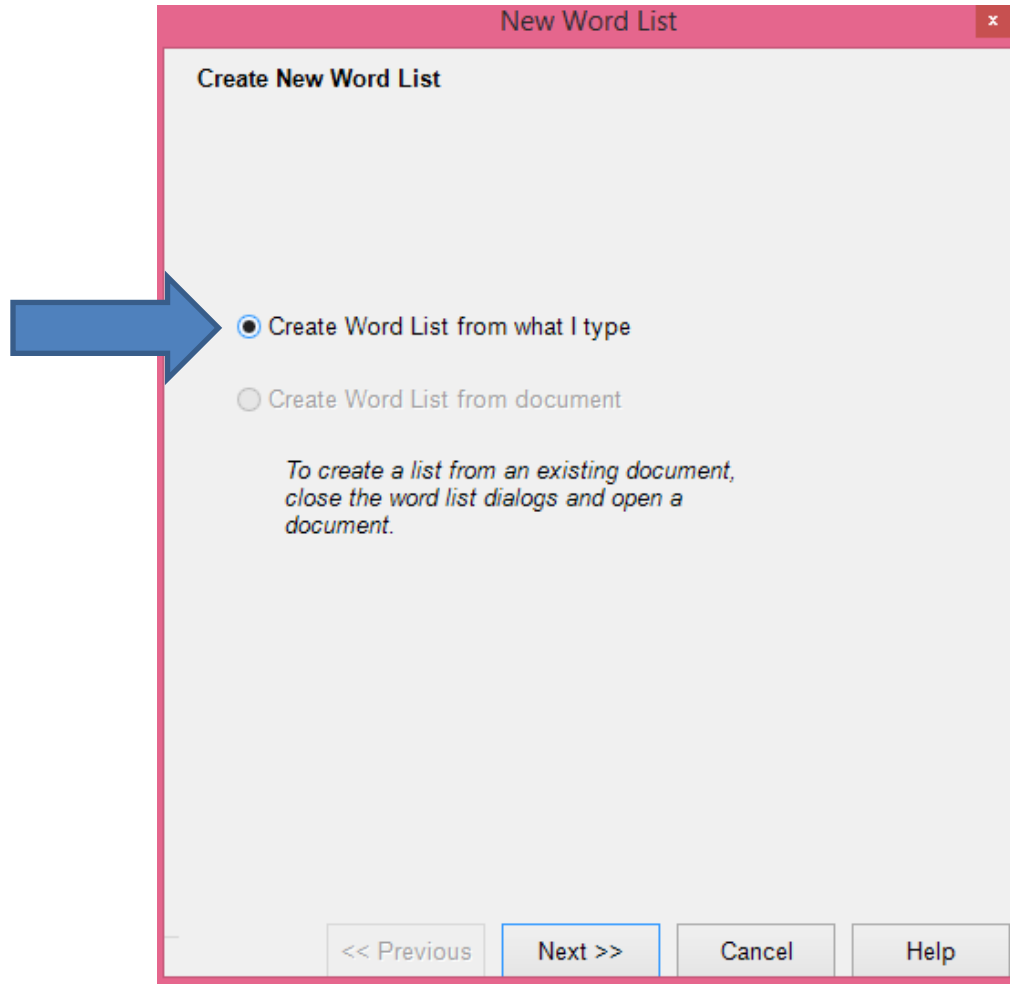
Word Lists – Select “New”



Two Options

- From words we type in
- From words gathered from a document that is open in Kurzweil 3000

Create from Words I Type



Then click "Next"

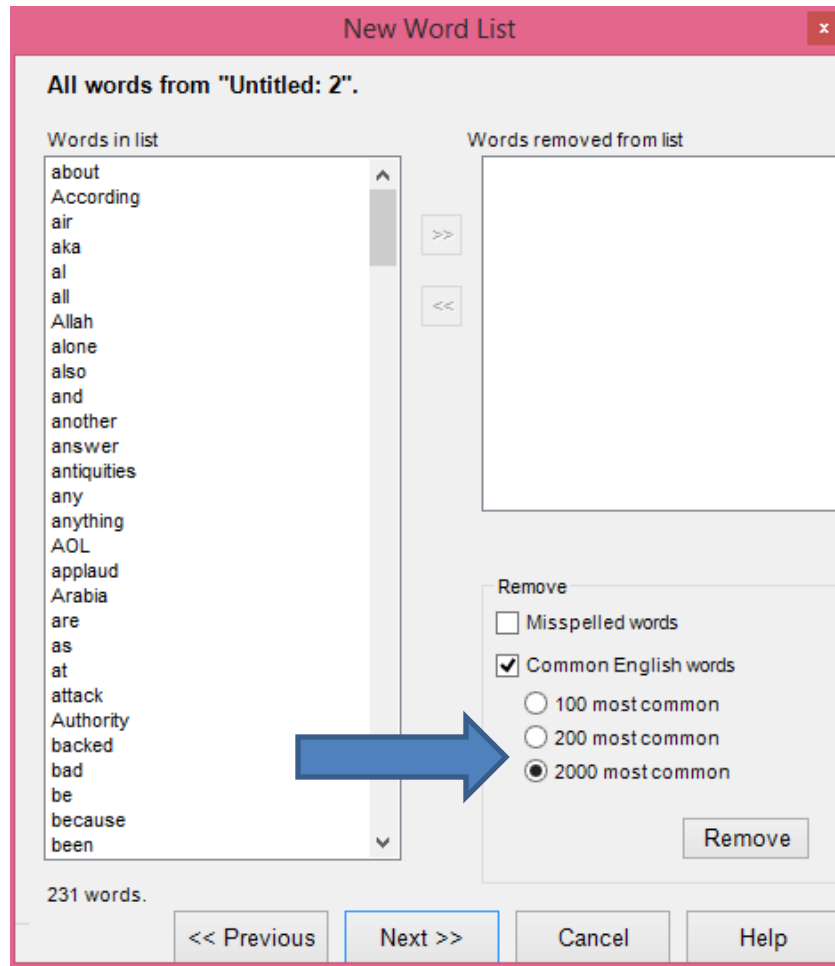

Remove Most Common Words

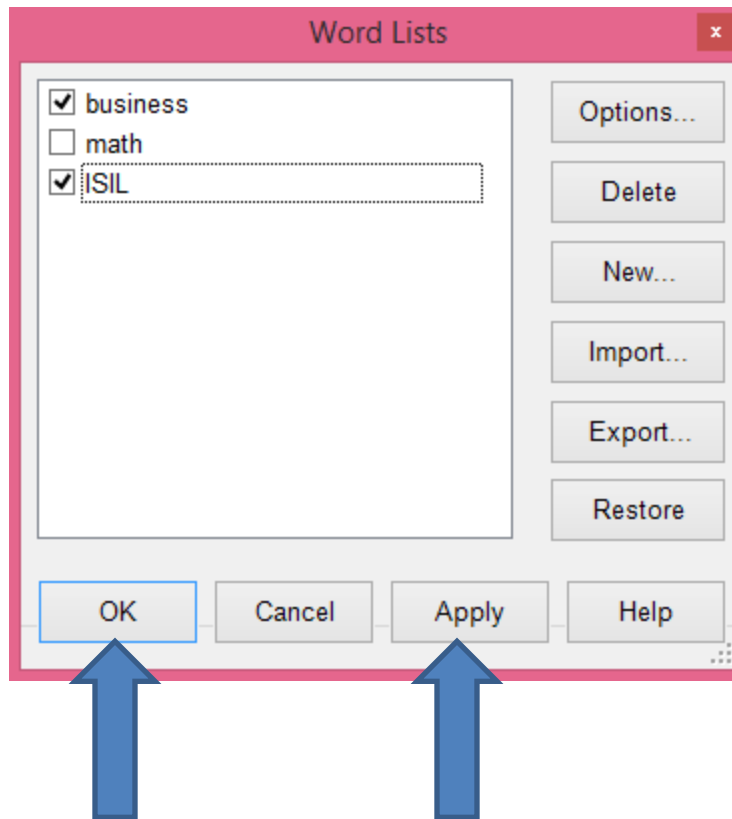


Click “Common English words” and then choose how many to remove.

The more you remove, the more specific your word list will be to the topic.

Click “Next” and then “Save”.

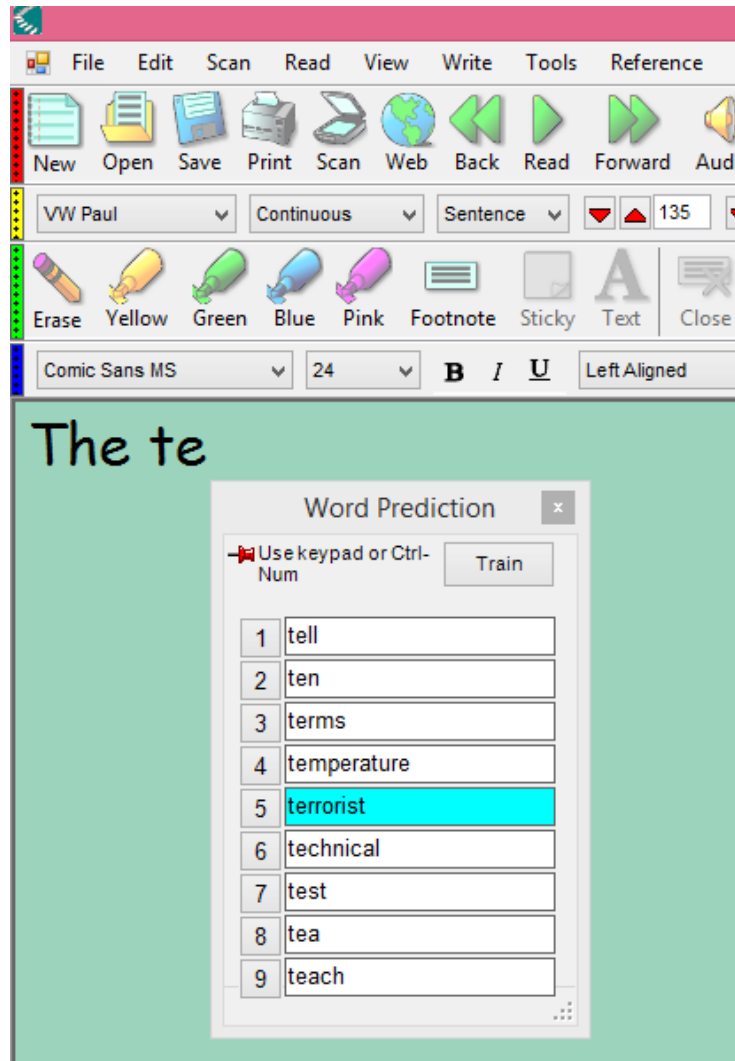
Activate Your List



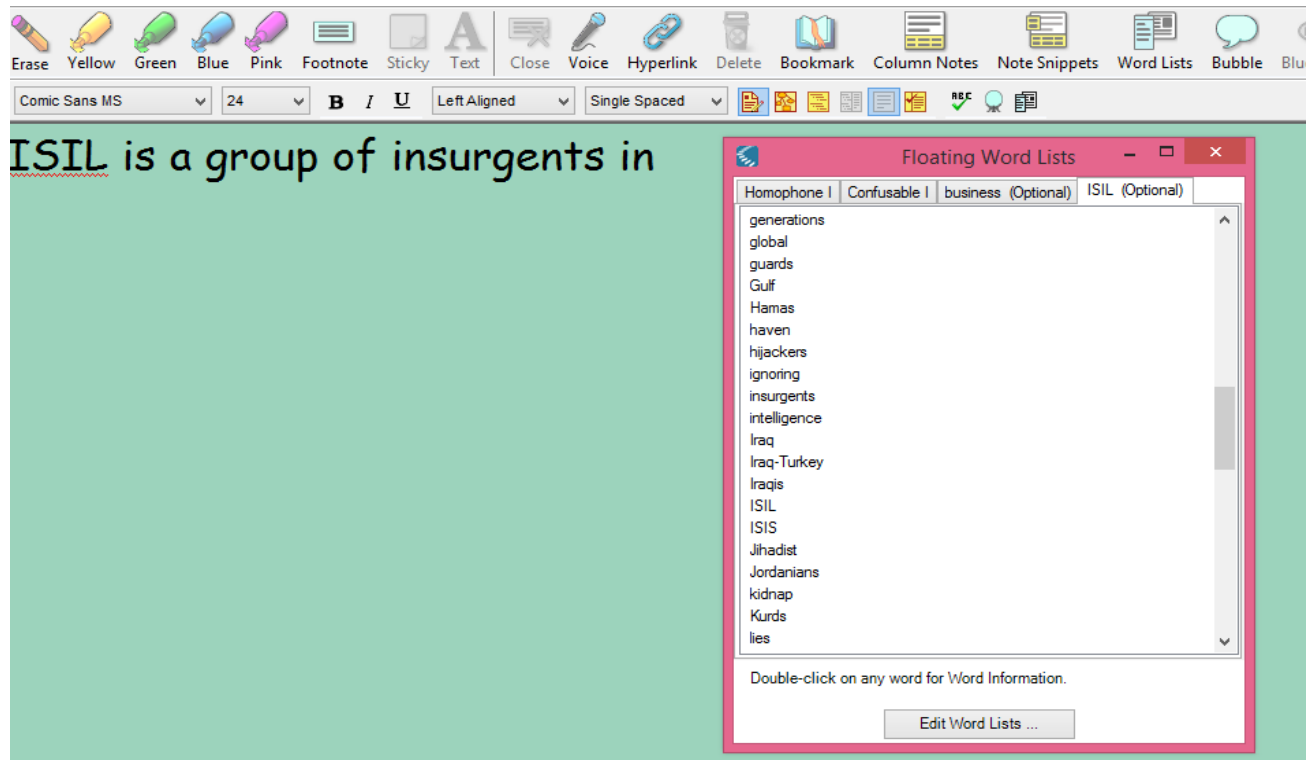
Your word list will appear with other saved word lists. It will be activated with a check mark. You may choose to deactivate other lists to give your topic vocabulary preference in word prediction. Click “Apply”, then “OK”.

Use your Topic Vocabulary

These words will be given preference in word prediction.



Use your Topic Dictionary



Use a Floating Word List to show the whole topic list to help remind students of possible things to include in their writing.
